We are excited to announce WIN 2011, the third Workshop on Information in Networks. Abstract Submission:

Participants will be selected based on submissions of *3-page extended abstracts*. Please submit an extended abstract of no more than 3 pages to **Shirley Lau** (info@winworkshop.net) no later than August 20, 2011. Abstracts will be evaluated as they are submitted and evaluation will continue until the program is filled. Space is limited, so interested researchers should submit as soon as possible.

Authors of accepted abstracts will be notified by September 1, 2011 and will be expected to send in the final version of their submitted work (not to exceed 5 pages, including references and figures) by September 15, 2011. These will be available as part of the WIN informal workshop notes. Members of the press may attend the event and submission therefore indicates no objection to their presence during presentations.
